

present perfect and simple past: revise the basics



meanings Both these tenses are used to talk about **finished** actions, situations and events. There is a difference.

The present perfect suggests that a finished action has some connection with the present. The simple past does not suggest a connection with the present.

I've made a cake. Would you like a slice? I didn't have much to do this morning, so I made a cake.

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time words We **don't** often use the **present perfect** with words for a **finished time**.

I went out four evenings last week. (NOT I've been out ... last week.) Jamie phoned yesterday. (NOT Jamie has phoned yesterday.)

We often use the **present perfect** with words for **time up to now.**

I've been out three evenings this week. I've never seen a fox. Have you read this before? (= 'at any time up to now')
